## Clintonville Police Chief Terry Lorge to Retire

Chief of Police Terry Lorge has announced his retirement from the Clintonville Police Department effective April 8, 2016, 4 p.m.

Lorge has been in law enforcement for nearly 43 years, serving over 37 years with Clintonville including 20 years as Chief of Police.

"I care deeply for this community and I will miss the challenges, camaraderie and being involved in the everyday operations of the Police Department. The officers and staff of the Police Department are professional and hard working, and the community is in good hands," stated Lorge. He went on to say, "The Clintonville Police Department is a highly respected agency in the law enforcement community, and I am honored to have been a part of it for all of these years."

## Radix Retires after 33-Year Career with First State Bank

First State Bank recently announced that long-time chief executive officer and former bank president, Harry A. Radix, retired on January 29, after a 33-year career with First State Bank and 40 years in banking.

Radix started in banking in 1974 at a bank in Green Bay while attending St. Norbert College. When Radix came to First State Bank (FSB) in April 1983 a cashier, he was in charge of the bank's accounting, data processing, and micro-computer departments. "In today's highly electronic world, it's hard to remember that there was a time when computers and electronic banking were not commonplace," commented Radix. "First State Bank installed its first ATM in 1985 and it really wasn't until the 1990s that banking technology took a significant leap forward."

Radix was promoted to vice president and cashier in 1984 at which time human resources

was added to his responsibilities. He was again promoted in 1990 to senior vice president and cashier, and was elected to FSB board of directors in 1991. Later that year, Radix was named executive vice president and chief executive officer (CEO). He was elected bank president in 1994, a position Radix held until early 2015 when his retirement plans were officially announced and Robert Van Asten was named to succeed him as president. For the past year, Radix has continued as CEO, working closely with Van Asten and the bank's board of directors to assure a smooth transition.

Under Radix's leadership, FSB expanded from two to six bank offices and grew total assets from \$131 million in 1990 to \$260 million as of today. His banking leadership extended far beyond FSB. He served leadership roles and on committees for regional, state and national banking organizations like the Bank Administration Institute, Wisconsin Bankers Association, ABA Community Banker's Council and Waupaca County Banker's Association. "There were always opportunities to learn how other banks were doing things in their communities and to help our industry stay on top of issues and initiatives there were important," said Radix.

Community involvement was also a hallmark of Radix. “As an independent community bank, First State Bank has always been a leader in the communities it serves through its charitable contributions and by encouraging staff members to be involved,” he commented.

Radix, himself, volunteered for dozens of organizations and community efforts over the years. He was one of the individuals that led the effort to keep a United Way in New London. He served on the New London family Medical Center board for 12 years as board member as well as treasurer. He was a founding member of the Wolf River Area Healthcare Foundation (now ThedaCare Foundation-New London) and served as its president from 2003 to 2012. During that time, the Foundation raised funds for a number of hospital needs including the remodeling of the birth center and a new chemotherapy suite.

Harry was that inspiration for me.”

## Inspiring and True Stories Shared

Visitors to ThedaCare Physicians in Clintonville and Tigerton will notice a few changes—a new sign out front featuring the healthcare system's new logo and colorful message boards inside the clinic highlighting stories from patients, providers and the community. Each message board features pictures of local people telling their stories.

The message boards and new sign are part of an organization-wide rebranding initiative launched by ThedaCare at the end of 2014.

On the Clintonville message board, Patty talks about her battle with breast cancer and kidney cancer. Her medical provider, Rita Braund, a physician assistant, has treated Patty since she was a teenager and also treated her mom, who had breast cancer. Using her knowledge of Patty's family history, Braund suggested she see a specialist when a mammogram showed mastitis. That push led to Patty's breast cancer being discovered, followed by the discovery of kidney cancer.

"Rita was persistent. She had a good hunch—that's what healthcare providers do," Patty said. "I'm always comfortable with her and trust her completely."

Patty had her cancerous kidney removed and underwent chemotherapy at ThedaCare Medical Center in Shawano. She is now doing well.

The rebranding closely ties the seven ThedaCare hospitals, physician clinics and specialty practices together while emphasizing its commitment to providing patient-centered care as a community healthcare partner. The brand transformation will be completed in 2016.

### Voter ID Required For Spring Primary, Tuesday, Feb. 16

The Spring Primary for elections is set for Tuesday, Feb. 16. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. New this year at all elections now in Wisconsin, voters must show an acceptable photo ID before a ballot will be provided.

The following information was found on the Bring It website:

<http://bringit.wi.gov>

The following five IDs, even if they expired after November 4, 2015 will be acceptable:

- A Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license, even if driving privileges are revoked or suspended.
  - A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card
  - A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card or driver license without a photo issued under the religious exemption
  - Military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service.
  - A U.S. passport book or card
- If you do not have one of these IDs, you can get a free state ID card to vote event if you do not have your birth certificate.

In 2014, the Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles started a new program to help people who don't have copies of their birth certificates to get a state ID card. Just bring the documents you have to your local DMV office. They can track down your birth records in Wisconsin or another state, but it may take some time so don't wait until the last minute.
